Fifty years ago, the health and human services landscape — and the world as we knew it — looked drastically different than what we know today. Thankfully, the idea of shifting the health care system from one of "fixing" diseases and health concerns to one of responsive care and prevention was starting to gain traction.

One such responsive program was the National Family Planning Program — or Title X (Ten). Established in 1970 to improve access to reproductive health services, prevent maternal deaths, and reduce unintended pregnancies, Title X made crucial care available to all regardless of income or status. Title X is still an integral piece of our nation's public health care system, and it is the cornerstone of the MFHS story. In June 1971, MFHS received a federal Title X grant to address family planning services for women right here in Northeastern Pennsylvania.

we started with a big goal

Our founding team was committed to improving family life, promoting responsible parenthood, and coordinating effective service delivery in a relatively tight radius. As the only local Title X grantee, family planning services were available at two MFHS sites in Luzerne County.

MFHS served 98 individuals in the first year, and its leadership was in tune with community needs. Luzerne County's high incidence of maternal and infant deaths and newborns with serious medical problems was impossible to ignore.

& gimed Along with offering family planning services, MFHS integrated affordable obstetric care in 1973. While the MFHS maternity service line — a Certified Nurse Midwifery Program with counseling and social supports — made strides towards delivering healthier babies, notable issues surrounding inadequate childhood nutrition gained the national spotlight.

& dug in deeper

In 1974, MFHS was one of 100 pilot projects in the country to administer the federally funded Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Nutrition Program. With a goal of serving slightly more than 630 participants a month, the staff and community embraced the importance of this new service line.

Our formative years set the roots for MFHS to thrive, and we've continued to flex and evolve over five busy — and impactful — decades.

Today, MFHS:

- Provides robust, accessible, and confidential family planning services at 5 direct service sites and 27 contract service providers.
- Delivers more than 200 healthy babies a year and provides supplementary family supports.
- Stewards a \$9.7M WIC budget and serves 41,211 participants in 17 counties.
- Serves over 90,000 individuals and families in 17 counties.

MFHS reaches WIC milestone

MFHS became the largest WIC provider in Pennsylvania, both in geographic footprint and number of participants, when we took over operations in Bucks County in the fall of 2021. This expansion included the opening of three new WIC offices in Bristol, Warminster, and Quakertown. MFHS staff worked closely with the Bucks County Department of Health to ensure a seamless transition and zero interruption of WIC services to the clients in Bucks County.

Recognizing excellence in customer service

The Greater Scranton Chamber of Commerce recognized MFHS with the 2021 SAGE award for Best Practices in Customer Service, which is a reflection of the hard work and dedication that MFHS staff showed during the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic. MFHS launched a series of client surveys as part of Listen4Good project. Listen4Good is a national effort designed to help nonprofits build sustainable, high-quality, client-focused feedback loops that

lead to meaningful change. The Listen4Good project was a major highlight in the Best Practices in Customer Service nomination. Based on the survey question: "How likely is it that you would recommend Maternal and Family Health Services to a friend or family member?" across all programs, the Net Promoter Score for MFHS is higher than that of peer organizations. Highest scores in the survey were in response to questions about meeting client needs, and staff treating clients with respect.

When asked what MFHS did well, client quotes highlighted the outstanding care and customer service provided by MFHS staff:

MFHS awarded WIC innovation grant

MFHS is working to streaming the WIC certification process through a USDA Innovation Grant provided by the PA Bureau of WIC. The project utilizes medical liaison staff and data from the statewide Health Information Exchange to expedite the enrollment process. The project aims to reduce the time for in-person WIC certification and enrollment, increase awareness of WIC among obstetric and pediatric providers, and improve referrals and coordination between WIC and medical providers.

WIC Nutrition

The WIC Nutrition Program improves the lives of at-risk families by promoting good nutrition. Through nutrition counseling, electronic eWIC benefits for healthy food options, and breastfeeding support, we are fostering healthier pregnancies, improved birth outcomes, better growth and development of young children, and a reduction in childhood obesity.

Breastfeeding Support

We are improving breastfeeding rates by providing new moms with education and support. New moms are paired with Breastfeeding Peer Counselors, other local mothers who have breastfed for at least 6 months. Peer Counselors act as educators and role models and demonstrate how valuable breastfeeding can be to the health, nutrition and emotional state of the baby and new mom team.

Maternity Care

Access to early prenatal care is vital to the health of both mother and baby. Partnering with Moses Taylor Hospital Family Birthing Suites in Scranton, we provide low-income, pregnant individuals with comprehensive prenatal and postpartum care — including medical, nutrition and social services. Through funding sources, such as Healthy Beginnings Plus, we assist our patients in achieving healthy pregnancies and developing long-term healthy lifestyles for themselves and their families.

Reproductive Health

We believe every person, regardless of age, insurance status, or ability to pay, should be able to access quality reproductive healthcare. That's why we offer accessible, confidential family planning and related preventive care to women, men, and teens in 15 Pennsylvania counties. Through Title X of the Public Health Service Act, we prioritize the needs of low-income and uninsured women, men, and teens by offering free care to those whose incomes fall below the federal poverty level.

Senator Schwank visits Berks County WIC

State Senator Judy Schwank toured the Berks County WIC Nutrition Center in Reading, where she was able to meet with the staff and learn more about the services provided by WIC and the essential role the program plays in protecting the health and nutritional status of over 8,000 at-risk women, children, and families in Berks County. Senator Schwank was able to see firsthand the nutrition education, breastfeeding support, referrals, and access to healthy food that WIC provides to the families in her district.

MFHS launches WIC+ campaign

In an effort to highlight all of the benefits that come with WIC, MFHS partnered with Posture Interactive to develop a fully integrated Marketing Campaign - WIC +more - with new messages focusing on the extended benefits of WIC. The campaign ran throughout the 17 county MFHS service area on traditional and digital platforms, and highlighted WIC benefits like breastfeeding support, keeping kids on WIC until age 5, eligibility for foster parents and grandparents raising grandchildren, and more.

Nurse-Family Partnership

The Nurse-Family Partnership empowers mothers to develop critical parenting skills and knowledge through the guidance and support of highly trained nurse home-visitors. With funding from the Pennsylvania Office of Child Development and Early Learning, we partner at-risk moms — many of whom are teens — with visiting nurses who provide health, planning and goalsetting education. Through this evidence-based program, parents learn skills that set them up for a lifetime of health and economic selfsufficiency. In 2021, MFHS introduced NFP+, which allows pregnant mothers who have had children previously and have highrisk factors to benefit from the NFP program.

SafeTeens

Through a website, text line and hotline, the MFHS SafeTeens initiative provides adolescents across Pennsylvania's 67 counties with the knowledge to prevent unplanned pregnancies and make informed, healthy choices about their futures. The programs enable teens to take charge of

their health on the engaging, innovative platforms that they use the most. MFHS continues to bring reproductive health education to at-risk teens in local school districts through such programs as the SafeSpace Health Resource Center.

Behavioral Health

MFHS Behavioral Health provides a comprehensive approach in assessment and treatment for maternity and reproductive health patients who have a mental health or substance use dependency. In addition, the MFHS therapists provided case management services that included referral and linkage to needed interventions as well as monitoring service delivery to atrisk patients.



Introducing our new look

Celebrating NFP at 20

In 2002, MFHS brought the Nurse-Family Partnership Program to first-time mothers in Lackawanna and Wayne Counties. Since then, NFP has expanded to include Susquehanna, Luzerne and Carbon Counties, and serves not only first-time mothers, but at-risk pregnant women with children as well. For 20 years, the nurses of NFP have provided vital health, planning and goalsetting education to families in need in our community.


